Proposed Bylaws change ARTICLE V OFFICERS

Section 1. Enumeration and Election of Officers. The Officers of the League shall be a President, an Administrative Vice President, a Program Vice President, a Voter Service Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The President, the Administrative Vice President, and the Secretary shall be elected in odd numbered years. The Program Vice President, the Voter Service Vice President, and the Treasurer shall be elected in even numbered years.

Change to read:

Section 1. Enumeration and Election of Officers. The Officers of the League shall be a President, an Administrative Vice President, a Program Vice President, a Voter Service Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The President, the Voter Service Vice President, and the Secretary shall be elected in odd numbered years. The Program Vice President, the Administrative Vice President, and the Treasurer shall be elected in even numbered years.

The reasoning behind the change is that it is very difficult for the Voter Service Vice President to be elected and face a General Election within a couple of months of taking office. This is especially true in a Presidential election year. The board and the Nominating Committee believe that this change would allow the Voter Service Vice President time to learn the ins and outs of the office before facing a major election cycle.
