

The next step was the board vote to support a \$500 donation to the Irvington High School "We the People" team. As state champions they will represent California at the national competition in D.C. We salute these young scholars, their diversity, their teamwork, and their dedication to being the best when defending the U.S. constitution and the Bill of Rights.

## BOB WASSERMAN INTERVIEWED

Bob Wasserman, Fremont's new Mayor, met with League members, Sam Neeman and Letha Saldanha. They covered a number of areas with the Mayor. Bob is taking a very practical approach to his role. He explained Fremont does not have a "strong Mayor" form of government and he works as one member of the City Council with the City Manager. In addition to representing the City to other governmental agencies and ceremonial duties, he believes he works with Council to create one direction for the city.

His main priorities are two fold: First, working with the council and city manager to improve our current financial situation. Secondly focus on a combination of economical and cultural growth. The City wants to change Fremont into a well rounded city that has the services people want, enticing the 30,000 people who leave Fremont to shop, eat and play to do it here. To those ends, his focus areas include continuing to de-

## ALAMEDA COUNTY LEAGUES MONITOR COUNTY JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

In 2001, the Alameda County Board of Supervisors considered replacing the old unsafe 300 bed County Juvenile Hall in San Leandro with a larger 550 bed facility in Dublin. You may remember media reports of the resulting controversy, which included demonstrations at the Board meetings by young people. They and advocates for juvenile justice argued that the funds should be spent instead on a smaller facility and better services. The Board was urged to look at other jurisdictions such as Cook County, Illinois (which contains Chicago) and Santa Cruz County in California, who have drastically reduced the number of youth in secure facilities by using a broad spectrum of prevention, intervention and diversion programs as alternatives to incarceration. The Board eventually voted to build a new hall in San Leandro with less than 550 beds.

Also, In response to the lobbying of the advocates, the Board initiated their own study of the present county juvenile justice system. The study was to: 1) develop statistics on the demographics of the Alameda County, a profile of the current incarcerated youth population in the county and their needs, and present prevention, intervention and diversion programs in the county; 2) get input from interested groups in the County and 3) make recommendations. Bobbie Huskey and Associations from Cook County were hired to conduct the study and presented their Final Report to county officials at the end of 2004.

During the Study, the LWV Alameda County Juvenile Justice Committee met with Bobbie Huskey. Two members of the Committee were appointed to the Steering Committee which oversaw the Huskey Study. The Committee also interviewed county officials on many of the issues covered by the study and included in our County and State positions. The committee is impressed with the soundness of most of the over 85 recommendations and hope to see as many of them implemented as possible. We intend to stay involved. Members of the Committee will attend the monthly meetings of the Public Protection sub-committee of the Board of Supervisors where such implementation will be discussed. Two members of the LWV Alameda County Juvenile Justice Committee serve on the County Juvenile Justice Commission. When it is appropriate, we will be advocating for particular recommendations.

For example, The Leagues of Women Voters in Alameda County recently sent a joint letter to the Board of Supervisors expressing our concern about the quality of Juvenile Hall counselors and their supervision. League concern was aroused by a February 7, 2005 Oakland Tribune article reporting inappropriate activities of counselors, who encouraged "wrestling matches" among incarcerated youth. The Leagues stated that Juvenile Counselor recruitment qualifications need to be re-examined, along with a serious look into why there was not proper supervision/ management of the counseling staff.

The Leagues asked the County Board of Supervisors to facilitate a study of youth experiences with their counselors as well as a detailed analysis of requirements for counselor hiring and supervision, the training materials used, the amount of training required, and what evaluation standards the supervisors have for counselor accountability, attitudes, and behaviors. The results could be used

to learn if the important duties of counselors are matched by their qualifications, training, expectations for performance, and quality supervision. The Leagues hope to work with Chief Probation Officer Blevins, supporting him in his efforts to improve the environment in the Hall.

## **Lewin Group Report on Universal Health Care Coverage Model**

*The Health Care for All Californians Act: Cost and Economic Impacts Analysis*, the long anticipated report of the Lewin Group, was released January 19. Senator Sheila Kuehl was joined at a press conference by John Shiels, Vice President of the Lewin Group, who conducted an analysis of SB 921, Kuehl's 2003-2004 bill to reform health care coverage in California. The Lewin study projected and compared the cost of health care in California under the current system and under the single payer system defined by SB 921. An earlier study for the state's landmark Health Care Options Project (HCOP), which compared three theoretical single payer models, also was conducted by the Lewin Group.

The new study indicates that the April 2004 version of SB 921 provides even greater savings than the models analyzed for the earlier HCOP study. The basic structure which creates the savings will not be changed as Kuehl's proposal is further amended for the 2005-2006 legislative session.

In addition to the analysis of SB 921, the Lewin study corroborates findings from other government studies on administrative, bulk purchasing and primary care savings. The Lewin findings also corroborate real-world cost savings experienced in single payer systems such as Medicare, the Veteran's Administration, Kaiser Permanente and the Canadian health care system.

Highlights of the SB 921 analysis include:

- Health care spending for coverage of all California residents would result in a reduction of \$8 billion in total health care spending in the first year.
- First year administrative costs would be reduced to 1.8 percent of health system expenditures, compared to California's current administrative system expenditures of about 30 percent.
- Administrative simplification would lower administrative costs by about \$20 billion in the first two years alone.
- Costs of providing services to currently uninsured and underinsured Californians would be around \$17 billion the first year and would be offset by savings of \$25 billion from reduced administrative costs and bulk purchasing of prescription drugs and durable medical equipment.
- First year savings of \$5.2 billion on the cost of pharmaceuticals and durable medical equipment would be achieved through the use of the state's purchasing

power to negotiate price discounts.

- Expanded use of primary and preventive care would provide savings of \$3.4 billion during the first year.
- Total savings over the first decade are estimated to be \$343.6 billion, of which \$43.8 billion are savings to state and local governments.
- Estimated state and local government savings would include savings of \$1 billion on the cost of employee and retiree benefits in 2006.
- Californians would save money in spite of the fact that benefits provided by this insurance model for all residents include hospitalization, prescription drugs, dental, vision, and durable medical equipment coverage with no co-payments or deductibles.

Senator Kuehl pointed out, "The findings of the report confirm that California can create a fiscally sound state insurance plan that covers every Californian with a solid, comprehensive health plan, reduces costs and controls health cost inflation. . . . Finally--and this is very important--The Lewin Report is based on a model in which every Californian has access to the physician of his or her choice."

## **Plans for Health Care Reform Legislation**

During the 2003-2004 legislative session SB 921 gained the support of 26 coauthors and many organizations, including the LWVC, and was passed by the Senate and by the Assembly Health Committee. In mid-February Senator Kuehl plans to introduce a new bill, the California Health Insurance Reliability Act (CHIRA), which will build on the health insurance model of SB 921. Senator Kuehl was joined at the January press conference by Senate President pro Tempore Don Perata, who pledged his support in moving the legislation in the coming legislative session. In addition, more legislators have committed to co-authoring the 2005-2006 bill.

New provisions being considered include a tax structure that would replace, at much lower cost, what individuals and employers now pay for health care.

The LWVC has not yet formally supported the upcoming bill and eagerly awaits the opportunity to see it in detail.

The workshops will offer a variety of stimulating topics in two time frames, with skills training on Friday and issues workshops on Saturday. Choosing among them will offer a challenge to delegates. **“OUR COMMUNITY, WHO BELONGS?”**  
 On March 10, the League of Women Voters of Fremont, Newark and Union City helped sponsor a public program at Irvington High School, titled “Our Community, Who Belongs”, an anti-hate forum given to more than 200 attendees. Speakers, students and adults, gave testimony to personal difficulties they have had to face, especially since the September 11, 2001 terror attacks on the World Trade Center in New York City.  
 Beliefs were expressed that many people are unaware of religious beliefs and practices of Muslims, Sikhs and other religions. Further speakers stated that some who indulge in overt hate expressions or crimes are confusing fellow U.S. citizens with the actual people who planned and did the terrorists acts.  
 California attorney General, Bill Lockyer, who as a State Senator, wrote the first felony hate crime law in the United States. His speech emphasized the fact that almost all U.S. citizens are immigrants and that immigrants have been “risk takers” who have contributed much to our country.
